#### Course description and objectives

This is designed as an introductory course to the European Union (EU), and its legal order, for foreign law students.

This course is designed to allow students to understand the key concepts and institutions of EU law, and the regional integration politics of coordinated policies regarding some major XXIst Century challenges.

The course will examine the integration theories and the singular EU constitutional order, as well as the fundamental EU values guiding the European legal Order. An overview of the sources of law and legal reasoning at European Union level and study of the characteristics of European legislation (Treaties and directives) and EU case law will be offered.

This will enable us to look into some key challenges, within a globalized world, that the EU has to face: sustainability and climate change, security and defense, single market development, competition law.

The seminar will rely on case studies and press articles to enable students to understand the context and implications of EU law, as well as helping to familiarize them with some of the most significant caselaw in the area.

Teaching will be in seminar format, with interaction between professor(s) and students.

# **Prerequisites**

An academic pre-requisite is 2 years of full-time law study.

## Learning outcomes

After completion of the course the student should be able to:

- Comprehend the regional integration theories;
- Understand the founding principles of the EU;
- Master the institutional framework of the EU;
- Comprehend the integrated and coordinated policy approach championed by the EU.
